### Report back: Society of Neuroscientists of Africa: 12th International Meeting

Dear Professor Prinetti

On behalf of the Society of Neuroscientists of Africa (SONA), the Southern African Neuroscience Society (Host Society) and the University of KwaZulu-Natal (Host University), I wish to convey our sincere gratitude for the sponsorship we received from the International Society for Neurochemistry.

The 12th International SONA meeting was held in Durban South Africa (26-30 March 2015). Nineteen countries were represented; 11 from Africa viz. South Africa, Zimbabwe, Zambia, Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC), Kenya, Uganda, Ethiopia, Cameroon, Nigeria, Egypt and Morocco. Countries represented from outside Africa were; Sweden, Switzerland, Italy, Spain, Spain, United Kingdom, France and Israel. Total attendance at the meeting was 203 people.

Feedback from the meeting suggests that by all accounts, it was a successful meeting. Prior to the meeting we also hosted 4 satellite events viz.

### • Writing Workshop (22-25 March)

Students from across Africa who were at PhD/Postdoc level with data were invited to apply. They received help in translating their data into publications.

# Open hardware and software for low-cost neuroscience equipment (22-25 March)

This was to help with designing equipment that can be useful in a poorly equipped lab. The Trends in Neuroscience group, donated a 3-d printer that they had used in this workshop to the University of KwaZulu-Natal.

• A network meeting hosted by NIH/Fogarty focusing on an implementation Science Agenda: Linking Researchers, Policymakers, Programme Implementers and communities. (25 March)

Also piggybacking on SONA 2015 was the International League Against Epilepsy (ILAE), Commission of African Affairs (CAA) meeting (24-25 March)

Ten plenary sessions were organized. These comprised of 6 speakers from Europe, 1 from the United States of America and 2 from Africa. One plenary slot was reserved for a deserving IBRO Alumnus to give the James Kimani Memorial Lecture. This year the honour went to Dr Fleur Howells from the University of Cape Town in South Africa.
