Report on the ISN Educational Symposium on 'History of International Society for Neurochemistry (ISN) in Africa' during the 14<sup>th</sup> International Conference of the Society of Neuroscientists of Africa (SONA) and 17<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference of the Neuroscience Society of Nigeria (NSN), 23-27 March, 2019 at Radisson Blu Hotel Ikeja, Lagos, Nigeria.

**Organizer/Chair of Symposium:** Amadi O. Ihunwo, University of the Witwatersrand, Johannesburg, South Africa

Despite the initial acceptances to participate at the Symposium, Professors Michael Zigmond (USA) and Prof Alfreda Stadlin (United Arab Emirate) declined participation due to concerns on a likelihood of post-election security challenges in Nigeria. However, they were replaced by the first African ISN Councillor, Professor Polycarp Nwoha from Nigeria and Dr Lekpa K David on the recommendation of the Chair of the ISN Young Scientist Steering Committee (YSSC), Dr Eva-Maria Blumrich. The approach adopted for the symposium was to look at the History of the ISN activities in Africa in terms of the past (Prof Nwoha) the present (Prof Ihunwo) and the future (Dr Lekpa), and then opportunities for postgraduate trainings in Holland (Ms Overbeek). The titles of the talks were presented in the order below.

- **a.** 'ISN in Africa my perspective' by **Professor Polycarp Nwoha** of Obafemi Awolowo University, Ile-Ife, Nigeria (First African ISN Councillor)
- **b.** 'ISN at Present and 'Benefits and Funding Opportunities through the International Society for Neurochemistry (ISN) for African Neuroscientists: My journey so far' by **Professor Amadi O. Ihunwo** (2<sup>nd</sup> African ISN Councillor), University of the Witwatersrand, Johannesburg, South Africa
- c. 'The future of ISN as envisaged by the 'ISN Young Scientist Steering Committee (YSSC) and presented by **Dr Lekpa K. David** of the University of Port Harcourt, Port Harcourt, Nigeria
- **d.** 'Study in Holland: Open to International Minds' by **Ms Marlies Overbeek**, Director Marketing & Admissions The Netherlands at Navitas.

The symposium provided insights to the several roles ISN had played from way back in 1999 to the present. Professor Nwoha, provided the historical interactions at the 1999 Joint conference of the ISN/ESN in Berlin, Germany, between the then ISN Secretary General, Professor Bernd Hamprecht and Professors Polycarp Nwoha and Amadi Ihunwo which ignited the interest of the African region in ISN activities (see Flashback Photos 1 and 2). Professor Hampretch had extended an invitation to individual members of the International Brain Research Organization (IBRO) in 1999, which was how Professors Nwoha and Ihunwo became aware of the ISN. Professor Nwoha's interest in ISN resulted in his election as the first African Councillor on the ISN Council. Following from this conference the ISN-CAEN began a deliberate attempt in incorporating members from Africa into its committees and increased funding to those from the continent. Subsequently, Prof Amadi Ihunwo presented the continuous roles played by several past Chairs of ISN-CAEN to continue the growth of ISN activities and funding on the African region beginning from the time of Professor Roger Butterworth. Professor Butterworth was recognised a providing a great motivation for members of ISN from Africa with funding opportunities and engagement with the Society of Neuroscientists of Africa (SONA). Other chairs of the ISN-CAEN such as Steven Pfeiffer, Francisco Barrantes, Mike Cousin, Vilma Martin, Roberto Cappai, Caroline Rae and to the present chair Alessandro Prinetti have maintained these interactions with members from the African continent. Professor Ihunwo then shared his personal story from that 1999 ISN meeting in Berlin to receiving the ISN-CAEN funding for the two research visits to Prof Reinhard Schliebs laboratory at Paul Flechsig Institute for Brain Research, University of Leipzig, Germany in 2001 and 2002. Subsequently Prof Ihunwo received travel grants for conference attendances and became an active member of ISN. This was followed with activities as a member of ISN-CAEN under four different chairs, election as a Councillor (2011-2015) and membership of ISN School Initiative Committee. During Prof Ihunwo's tenure, more members from the African continent began engaging the ISN Community and received several funding. These funding increased the use of different neurochemical techniques in brain research projects on the continent.

Dr Lekpa David, a member of YSSC was mandated by their Chair to talk on the plans of the YSSC to further the vision and goals of the ISN. Considering that most attendees were either postgraduates, postdocs and young faculty, the Organizer, Prof Ihunwo invited Ms Marlies Overbeek from Holland to present opportunities for postgraduate and postdoctoral opportunities in the Netherlands (Holland). The symposium was attend by about 100 participants. Some current members of ISN who had benefitted from ISN funding were also among the participants (See Table below) and shared their current status and research activities following the grant received from ISN.
